## About the Site

Robbing banks may sound old-fashioned in today's high-tech world. But it's a crime problem that continues to take a toll on financial institutions and communities across the nation.

Each year, robbers collectively steal millions of dollars from banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations, armored car companies, and related businesses. In some cases, these criminals have weapons, and they threaten—and even kill—employees and customers.

At any given time, hundreds of bank robbers whose identities are unknown are sought by the FBI and its law enforcement partners around the country. To support the continuing efforts of investigators, the FBI launched its **Wanted Bank Robbers** website in December 2012 to enlist the public's assistance in helping to identify and track down suspects.

The **Wanted Bank Robbers** site is national in scope. This enables the public and investigators to draw possible connections between robberies across different cities and states.

- Electronic wanted posters with details on each robber and crime; and
- A printable version of each poster.

## How to Use the Search Tools

There are three ways to find bank robbers and robberies on the website.

1) Use the search tool at the top left of the homepage to search and sort robbers by name/nickname, city, state, or FBI field office. Check the appropriate boxes to pull up robbers who are male or female, are considered armed and dangerous, have committed serial robberies, or have rewards listed. You can use these search and sorting features in any combination. The search results will be displayed as red pins on the national map and in list/grid format below the map. Click a pin for a picture of the suspect(s), a brief overview of the robbery, and

a link to the wanted poster with more images and information. Due to the sensitive nature of these crimes, robberies will not always appear on the map if the locations are not publicized. In the list/grid format, click the suspect photo or the **More** link to view the



the **More** link to view the poster.

2) On the national map, scroll to any location of interest. Zoom in and out using your computer mouse or the +/- buttons in the lower right corner of the map. The display can be set to either map or satellite view. Click the red pin for a brief overview of the robbery, a picture of the suspect(s), and a link to the wanted poster.

**3)** Under the map, view a chronological list of bank robberies, starting with the most recent. Click the suspect photo or the **More** link to view

- A national map that plots robbery locations;
- A chronological list of robberies;
