Cases

s a standard rule, the FBI does not confirm or deny the existence of an investigation until the subject (s) are arrested, the case is charged, and the defendant(s) make their first appearance in court. The reason is not only to protect our ability to investigate the case, but also to safeguard the privacy and civil rights of subjects (who may be innocent), witnesses, and victims. This is a huge responsibility we do not take lightly: balancing the public's right to know with the integrity of the case and individual rights.

In a handful of exceptions, the FBI may reveal information about a case before a case is charged, typically when we need the public's help with finding a missing person or

fugitive or are seeking information about a subject's identity (see Investigative Publicity on page 16). The public could become aware of FBI activity, such as when they see agents executing a search warrant wearing FBI jackets. However, we often cannot provide additional details beyond confirming courtauthorized law enforcement activity or assuring the public of no threat to public safety. We may also assist a partner agency when requested or when the FBI has a tool, tactic, or technique that could benefit their investigations.

Even though we do not discuss investigations until the charging stage, careful and patient work is happening behind the scenes to gather the needed evidence for a

successful prosecution. FBI Seattle cases cover a variety of federal criminal violations, such as white-collar crime, violent crime, and national security matters including terrorism, counterintelligence, and cyber crimes. Our investigations become public record through court documents filed from Washington state's two United States Attorney's Offices, the Eastern and Western Districts of Washington. Leader of \$6.8 Million Pandemic Fraud Scheme Pleads Guilty to Wire Fraud and Money Laundering Charges

Paradise Williams, 29, the leader of a wide-ranging fraud scheme that stole more than \$3.3 million from federally funded pandemic assistance programs and attempted to obtain more than \$6.8 million, pleaded guilty to wire fraud and money laundering. Williams personally received more than \$2 million in fraudulent proceeds, spent on extravagant expenses.

Darlene Baker, 58 of Port Orchard, Washington, was

sentenced in March 2022 to 18 months in prison for her scheme to steal a \$500,000 bequest to a children's hospital and then a second \$500,000 stolen from a friend.

Two Nigerian Citizens Indicted for Attempting to Defraud the United States of Over \$25 Million

Defendants used thousands of stolen identities to obtain over \$2.4 million in fraudulent COVID-19 unemployment benefits

Two Nigerian citizens, Sakiru Olanrewaju Ambali, 45, and Fatiu Ismaila Lawal, 45, who currently reside in Toronto, Canada, were indicted for their scheme to steal COVID-19 disaster benefits and U.S. tax refunds.

Cyber Crime

Member of Notorious International Hacking Crew Sentenced

January 9, 2024 Millions of victims had their personal information stolen and sold by "ShinyHunters" group on the dark web A 22-year-old French citizen from Epinal, France, was sentenced to three years in prison and more than \$5 million in restitution for conspiracy to commit wire fraud and aggravated identity theft. Sebastien Raoult, aka "Sezyo Kaizen," was arrested in 2022 in Morocco and was extradited to the U.S. in January 2023.



Jason DeSimas, 45, Jason Stanley, 46, Randy Smith, 42, and Daniel Dorson, 27, each pleaded guilty to one crime of

committing a hate crime, as well as one count of making false statements to investigators about their role in the assault.

Indian Country Crime

Grand Coulee Man Sentenced to 5 Years in Prison for Violent Assault Against Partner, Tribal Elders

November 1, 2023 Xander Lee Ostenberg, 18, of Grand Coulee, Washington was sentenced to 60 months in prison. Ostenberg and his partner began fighting, and her grandfather and family friend rushed to her aid. Ostenberg hit the grandfather in the head causing him lose consciousness and attacked the family friend and began choking him. The family friend was eventually able to break free. At that point, Ostenberg dragged his partner out of the house, hit her, and put her in his vehicle.

White Swan Man Sentenced to 10 Years in Prison for Sexual Abuse of a Young Girl October 23, 2023 Charlie Jim Peters, 35, of White Swan, Washington was sentenced to 120 months in prison. Peters molested a sixteen-year-old victim while the victim was asleep inside a camper van.

Former King County Jail Guard and Five Others Indicted for Bribery Scheme That Brought Meth and Fentanyl into Seattle Jail

According to the indictment, former King County Jail Guard Mosses Ramos, 39, of Milton, Washington, worked as a correctional officer for 17 years from June 2006 until he was fired in September 2023.
According to the indictment, between March and May 2023, Ramos accepted bribes to bring methamphetamine and fentanyl into the jail for the benefit of inmates.

Enumclaw, Washington, Woman Sentenced for Criminal Scheme to Steal Flood Control Tax Dollars

January 6, 2023 Submitted false documents and forged signatures to collect more than \$465,000 in property taxes

The wife of the former longtime Commissioner of an East King County drainage district was sentenced to three years in prison for multiple federal felonies connected to a scheme to steal tax dollars intended for flood control. Joann Thomas, 67, was convicted of 15 federal felonies in May 2022: conspiracy, four counts each of wire fraud and mail fraud, two counts of aggravated identity theft and four counts of money laundering.

n advance of the 93rd Major League Baseball All-Star Week (July 7-11, 2023), FBI Seattle created a public awareness campaign about the FBI's role in special events preparation and safety, temporary flight restrictions (TFRs), and as the lead on investigations for Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS), commonly known as drones.

PSAs in both English and Spanish, pitched interviews with Special Agent in Charge (SAC) Collodi to local media outlets, and posted on social media. Partner agencies for the campaign were Seattle Mariners, Major League Baseball, U.S. Coast Guard, Federal Aviation Administration, and Seattle Police Department.

The FBI played a supporting but important role in All-Star Week.

The FBI provides counterterrorism and crisis management support at major sporting events, Republican and Democratic conventions, presidential inaugurations, and high-level government conferences. However, even though local law enforcement was the lead agency for All-Star Week, we wanted to increase awareness of the FBI's role in

overall event security and our leading role on drone investigations.

Temporary flight restrictions (TFRs) are not well known outside aviation, and they also change based on certain conditions.

We wanted to increase public awareness that airspace restrictions can change for special events due to the FAA issuing a TFR. This means special events have a "no drone zone" in place around the venue. TFRs define a certain area of airspace where air

travel is limited because of temporary hazardous conditions (such as a wildfire, hurricane, or chemical spill), a security-related event, or other special situations, like VIP movement. The TFR specifics (size, altitude, date/time, etc.) can be viewed on the FAA website or their mobile app B4UFLY. Under all circumstances, drone operators should check for airspace restrictions before they fly. While we expected more experienced drone operators to be familiar with the regulations, we knew that amateurs looking to get that perfect shot for social media might not do their research ahead of time.

Drones do not seem dangerous to the average person, and the public should take this issue seriously.

According to the FAA, incidents involving unauthorized and unsafe use of small, remotecontrolled aircraft have risen dramatically in recent years. The SAC's interviews gave recent Seattle examples of a Seahawks game, a Pride Parade, and Great Wheel and Space Needle crashes due to drones in which people or property were injured due to these little flying machines.

Next, we needed to educate about what the FBI could do. Law enforcement has ways to stop unsafe and illegal drone use, but we cannot speak to the specifics publicly. We assured media that law enforcement was monitoring and prepared to respond.

We explained potential federal criminal and civil statues for

flying a drone unsafely or under certain conditions (ex: night without required equipment, over people) or locations (ex: weather conditions, national defense airspace). Other consequences could include losing an expensive drone or substantial civil fines. We also wanted the public to report any reckless use of a drone to their local law enforcement.

Thanks to our media, law enforcement, and private sector partners helping us spread the word on broadcast and social media, the campaign performed well and reduced expected incidents with drones during All -Star Week.

Investigative Publicity

he FBI values tips from the public to help identify and locate fugitives, missing individuals, or unknown suspects, and the information we receive from the public is critical to our casework. To aid in this endeavor, field offices may distribute wanted, missing person, or seeking information posters to encourage people with information to contact the FBI. Sometimes, posters may include a reward leading to someone's recovery or capture.

Investigative publicity posters also include our most well-known poster category of the "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives." Since its inception, 526 fugitives have been featured on the "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" list, and 490 have been apprehended or located. To be featured on the Most Wanted List, the fugitive must be considered a particularly dangerous menace to society and/or have a lengthy record of committing serious crimes.

FBI Seattle issued the posters featured on the following page in 2023. When someone is located, we send an update to our media partners, post on our social media channels, and a version of the poster with a "recovered" or captured" banner will be placed on the website temporarily.

FBI Posters May Include:

Case Summary

The narrative we can share with the public leading up to a fugitive or missing person's disappearance, such as when and where the individual was last seen.

Descriptive Information

Any details to help the public recognize the person if encountered, such as eye or hair color, height, weight, date and place of birth, marks like scars or tattoos, locations where the person may travel, occupations, or known aliases.

Photos

The most recent and highest quality images available of the person will be included, as well as an approximate date they were taken. Sometimes, older photos or age-progressed images will be used if the person has been missing for a long time.

If a Fugitive Is Armed and Dangerous

As public safety is important to the FBI, any especially urgent reason to locate the person will be included.

Translations

Posters may be translated into a language besides English if the person is thought to have traveled to another country or if we believe a group who speaks another language has information about the person's whereabouts.

Recovering Missing Kids

Between December 2022 and March 2023. FBI Seattle FBI Seattle with our partners successfully recovered four children kidnapped from Washington state and taken out of state or to another country. Two of these children, Aranza Maria Ochoa Lopez and

Breadson John, are highlighted in missing person posters. Lopez had been missing for almost five years at the time of her recovery.

Typically, the FBI becomes involved in missing persons cases if local law enforcement requests assistance to provide a tool, tactic, or technique they do not have access to as part of their investigation. For potentially missing children,

Child kidnapping cases take a great deal of coordination with other law enforcement agencies, both in and outside the U.S., and with our legat offices, which further the FBI mission overseas. These cases demonstrate the dedication and compassion of FBI agents, victim specialists, and other personnel to the recovery, safety, and privacy of these young American citizens who have been illegally taken from our country.

the FBI was given jurisdiction under the "Lindbergh Law" in 1932 to immediately investigate any reported mysterious disappearance or kidnapping involving a child, usually 12 or younger. However, the FBI can open an investigation into any missing child under age 18 of as an assisting agency to the local police department. Learn more about the FBI's efforts to bring missing children home.

Fugitives

Branham and Pigida are examples of defendants who failed to appear for their court hearings, and Reid failed to report to prison after sentencing. All three were captured.

On August 4, Pigida failed to appear at his sentencing hearing for an \$11 million Ponzi

scheme defrauding thousands of victims. His poster was issued on August 21, and he was arrested October 24 in South Florida following an hours-long stand-off with FBI Miami.

Branham's poster was released on September 14, after previously being charged for alleged involvement in trafficking controlled substances, including fentanyl, and subsequent disappearance. The next day based on a tip, police arrested Branham at a Kent apartment where he was staying.

On April 28, Reid failed to self surrender to prison for operating a health care fraud kickback scheme. His poster was released on May 6, and he was located in less than a day in the same place he was last seen, Astoria, Oregon. A member of the public saw the poster, recognized Reid, and reported him as a fugitive.

Highlighting Old Cases

Despite recently becoming an FBI case, cousins Carlotta Maria Sanchez and Elsie Eldora Luscier have been missing since 1979. The FBI believes that even after 45 years, people have information about their disappearance from Taholah, Washington, on the Quinault Nation Indian Reservation. Living in Yuma, Arizona, Sanchez was visiting her cousin Luscier in Washington state when they both went missing. Because less information is currently known about Luscier, only one low resolution photo was available of her, which the FBI Lab enhanced to make it recognizable. FBI Seattle has several other posters on the website for Missing and Murdered Indigenous People, including for Chance Anthony Carson, also issued in 2023.

Seeking Information

When the FBI needs help identifying a subject(s), we may create a seeking information poster, such as for the vandalism of two locations in November 2022: the Birthright of Vancouver pregnancy resource center and the electrical substation in Tumwater, Washington.

Community Outreach

The FBI's Community Outreach Program supports the Bureau's investigative mission by working to address multiple interrelated societal problems—including crime. drugs, gangs, terrorism, and violence. Linking community service, prevention, and law enforcement is a national trend spurred by grass roots efforts around the country, and FBI Seattle employees have joined this movement. volunteering in a wide variety of community-related efforts. Some of these efforts are described below.

Citizen's Academy

Citizens Academy is an sixweek program that gives business, religious, civic, and community leaders an inside look at the FBI. Classes meet in the evening at the FBI field office. The mission of Citizens Academy is to foster a greater understanding of the role of federal law enforcement in the community through frank discussion and education. In 2023, FBI Seattle also held a shorter "C-suite" version of Citizens Academy for our local business leaders.

Seattle University Practicum

The Practicum provides Seattle University students an understanding of the FBI's role as a federal law enforcement agency to include the violations the FBI investigates, an overview of the different policies and programs within the FBI, and employment opportunities.

Teen Academy

The FBI Seattle Teen Academy program shows high school students a comprehensive look into today's FBI. Students receive presentations on topics such as cybercrime, counterintelligence, terrorism, evidence response, SWAT, and the daily field office operations.

Director's Community Leadership Award

Since 1990, the Director's
Community Leadership
Awards has been the principal
means for the FBI to publicly
recognize achievements of
individuals and organizations
that make extraordinary
contributions to education and
the prevention of crime and
violence in their communities.
Each field office nominates an
individual or organization for
the award, and recipients are
invited to a ceremony and
reception at FBI Headquarters.

FBI Seattle offers public speakers on various topics pertaining to the Bureau's investigative mission.
Additionally, FBI Seattle employees routinely participate in awareness events designed to build trust and strengthen relationships between the FBI and the communities we serve.















